How To Produce This Musical

The King Is Here can be produced very simply on a small stage or platform, which would be available in most schools and churches. It has actually been performed without a stage. In the productions that I have directed, we used only basic lighting. If available, occasional spot lights may be used, as desired, for the skits, dialogues, etc. I have always used 3 to 4 microphones in conjunction with the orchestral sound trax, which were played through a sound system. It is possible, however, to produce this with as little as a boom box, or to play the music live on a piano, keyboard, or guitar, using the lead sheets. If available, a drummer and bass player may be added, making a contemporary rock band. There are no vocal harmonies; the music is simple, appropriate for group singing or solos, if desired. This musical contains a total of 23 narrations and dialogues of various lengths which may be performed by a series of chosen narrators. Most are interspersed throughout the book, but three of them are included as a prelude on the lead sheets with the songs. The songs including narration are "The Boy in the Temple," "The Lord's Prayer," Triumphal Entry," and "The Great Commissison." Skits (actions during songs and narratives) are optional. Suggestions are included with the readings throughout the book.

Costumes are a major consideration in producing this play. They may be simple, for example, bath robes & bed sheets, or more elaborate, such as hand made or purchased costumes. Most characters require only a robe and head covering. A few characters may need more specialized costumes. For example, Jesus could be dressed in a white robe and head covering. Kings and queens would likely wear red or purple robes & crowns. If animals are desired during "Mary and Joseph," they may be dressed in sweats and masks.

Props include crowns for royalty may be purchased inexpensively, or made from gold or silver tinsel or pipe cleaner. A large baby doll may be used for Baby Jesus. Various characters could carry swords or spears during certain scenes.

The entire production takes slightly less than one hour. It is appropriate for school plays, presented during school hours, or as an evening performance at the school or a local church.

Worship Services, Sunday School and CCLI

All songs in this musical also have ccli #'s, and are licensed to be used in church services for congregational singing. The scores are marked with suggestions such as "opt.- solos" and "all sing" (congregation). Information concerning CCLI and licensing for congregational worship can be found on page 46.

(Matthew 2)

Melchior:	(Stands alone, looking heavenward)
Baltasar:	(Enters, looks at Melchior, then skyward) What are we looking for?
Melchior:	Don't you see it?
Baltasar:	See what? There's nothing up there but a bunch of stars.
Melchior:	That's what I'm talking about. Don't you see a star that looks kind of special?
Baltasar:	Oh, you mean that really bright one? That odd-looking staror group of stars?
Melchior:	Yes, that's the one.
Gaspar:	(Enters, looks at Melchior and Baltasar, then upward, and continues to stare at the sky) Why are we doing this? Oh, look at that funny-looking star over there!
Baltasar:	(Sarcastically) Oh, you see a star?!!
Gaspar:	What does it mean? It's so different from all the others.
Baltasar	I can't tell if it's a bright star or more than one together. In all the years I've been studying the heavens, this is the most unusual thing I've ever seen.
Melchior:	It's the strangest thing any of us has ever seen. There is something very special about that star. It can mean only one thing!
Gaspar:	Right! (Looks confused) But we don't know what it is!
Baltasar:	No, we don't know. But we're going to find out. We'll have to study our records and sacred writings to discover the meaning of this star. Let's meet here again tomorrow night.

Melchior: I'll be here.

- Gaspar: So will I. (The men separate. Each goes to his scrolls to read and to ponder.) (The men reassemble the next night)
- Melchior: I have spoken with others, who agree that the star we have seen is of great importance.
- Baltasar: I have studied the ancient Babylonian writings, and I believe that I am beginning to understand the meaning of this star. But it seems almost too marvelous to be true.
- Gaspar: Tell us.

Baltasar: Truly, much of our wisdom comes to us from the ancient Babylonian wise men. And much of their wisdom comes from Daniel. He was a prince in Judah, who was captured and taken to Babylon. He was chosen as advisor to kings of Babylon and Persia.

- Gaspar: I remember! I've heard a lot of stories about Daniel and his friends. Wasn't he the guy who ate the lion?
- Melchior: He was a man of great wisdom who could interpret dreams and see far into the future.
- Baltasar: Daniel was a great man. The kings put him in charge over all the wise men of Babylon. They must have learned a great deal from him.
- Melchior: Daniel gave all the honor to God for everything he did. Even the kings he served came to respect Daniel's God.
- Baltasar: Daniel studied the writing of the prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah. He understood that there would be signs given to men of a Messiah who would come to redeem God's people.
- Gaspar: Could it be true? You think it's possible that this star is the star that has come to proclaim the birth of this Savior? This would be the king of Israel! Ruler of the world!
- Melchior: We must go to find him. This is no ordinary king. His birth will be

honored by royalty from around the world.

- Baltasar: Daniel spoke of the kingdoms that would conquer Babylon, Persia, Greece, and even Rome. If this is the king that the prophets spoke of, then his kingdom will conquer all others. We must go. This star comes to announce his birth. It will also be our guide.
- Melchior: Let's follow this star. We must find him, this king of the Jews. We will honor him with our finest gifts!
- Gaspar: You are right. Let's go see this king who's going to smash Rome!
- Baltasar: I will bring frankincense.
- Gaspar: I think I'll bring some myrrh.
- Melchior: I have gold. Let's get ready to go.

HEROD

There sure seems to be a lot of excitement around here! What is wrong with this picture? Something doesn't seem to be quite right... I know! Nobody is paying attention to ME! That's what's wrong! Let me look out my royal window and see what could be so important that everybody would forget about ME!

What is going on out there? Look at that! Wise men and camels and donkeys. Wow! Look at all those presents! They must be coming to see ME! This is exciting! I'll send a messenger down to see what's going on.

*** (pause while Herod pretends to talk to someone offstage) I can't believe what that messenger said! Those wise men say they're coming to seek the King of the Jews?! That's ME! Why don't they get up here with my presents? Oh, yeah. He said they were looking for a baby. King Baby? Why would they be looking for a little kid instead of ME?

Fine! I'll send my messenger down to tell them to keep looking. I'll tell them that when they find him they should come and tell ME so that I can worship him too. And when I find him, that will be the end of that young upstart! There is only room for one King of the Jews, and that's ME! Once he's gone, the world can start revolving around ME again!

HEROD THE GREAT

(Matthew 2:1-22)

- 1: Man, Herod was a real meanie!
- 2: Which Herod?
- 1: You know, Herod in the Bible the one who killed the babies. He was one bad dude!
- 2: Herod was more than just one bad dude. There were a number of bad Herods.
- 1: You mean a lot of guys had the same name? And they were all bad dudes?
- 2: Sort of. Herod was not a name it was a title, like King, or Pharaoh.
- 1: I get it. So were they all mean?
- 2: Quite a few were. For example, Herod the Great, who had all the babies killed after Jesus was born.
- 1: Herod the Great the great big meanie, that is! I'd like to get him!
- 2: God already did.
- 1: Oh, yeah. He died, huh?
- 2: Yes, but it wasn't an easy death. No matter what he ate, he was still hungry. His stomach hurt all the time. Then everything hurt all the time. The pain drove him crazy. then he died.
- 1: Wow! Where does the Bible say all that?
- 2: The Bible doesn't say it the history books do. The Bible says that God does not let evil go unpunished. It also says that children are precious to God. Herod was one bad dude, all right. And he made one BAD mistake!

Girl: I'd better hurry and find my father's sheep. Then I'll run and tell my father and brothers about you, and about Jesus. Maybe we'll meet again soon!

John: I hope so. Goodbye.

- 2: Stealing his brother's wife. Herod and his sweetie both wanted to kill John, but they didn't dare, because they were afraid of the people. Most of the people liked John a lot better than they liked Herod.
- 1: I remember this story! His wife's daughter did the hootchie-kootchie at Herod's birthday party.
- 2: We don't know exactly what kind of dance she did, but we know that Herod liked it. He promised her anything she wanted, up to half of his kingdom.
- 1: Wow! What did she ask for?
- 2: The head of John the Baptist?
- 1: What?! Was she crazy?!
- 2: She asked her mother what she should ask for, and that's what her mom told her. Remember, her mother hated John the Baptist.

- 1: I guess Jesus was really sad about that.
- 2: Sure. John was his cousin and friend, besides being a great prophet.
- 1: Boy, I'd like to give it to them!
- 2: God already did.
- 1: Did He strike them with fire from heaven?
- 2: God is usually more subtle than that. First, Herod heard about Jesus, and he got really scared, because he thought John the Baptist had come back from the dead. He didn't sleep too well at night. Then the Roman emperor got angry at Herod and his "wife," and made them leave. Herod lost his kingdom and money and died in disgrace.
- 1: Wow! Where does the Bible say that?
- 2: The Bible doesn't say it. The history books do. The Bible says that your sin will surely find you out, and that you shouldn't pick on a servant of God. Herod was a bad dude, all right, and he made a baaad mistake!


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Tongues Of Fire

- 2: Most were. But Herod wasn't a name. It was a title, like King, or Pharaoh, or Caesar. Which Herod were you thinking of?
- 1: The one who killed the disciple James, just to make some of the religious leaders happy. Then he put Peter in jail, planning to kill him too, but God sent an angel to help Peter escape.
- 2: That was Herod Agrippa, the one Jesus called a fox. You're right. He WAS rotten!
- 1: I'd like to teach him a lesson!
- 2: God already did.
- 1: He did?
- 2: Yep. Herod gave a public speech, and people who wanted favors from him tried to flatter him. They said, "It's the voice of a god, not a man!" Herod loved it.
- 1: The Bible says that we should not accept praise or worship that should be given only to God.
- 2: Right. But Herod was so full of pride that he encouraged them. So an angel of God struck him, and he got worms. Really bad. Within five days, he was dead.
- 1: Wow. I guess he knows now that men calling you a god doesn't make you one.
- 2 I don't believe that he's confused any more about who God is. Herod was a bad guy, all right, and he made a really bad mistake.

"P" AS IN PETER

(Acts 4-6 and 9-12)

Prior to meeting Jesus, fishing was Peter's profession and preferred pastime. But Peter was a person of principle, who passionately proclaimed the truth to all people. His primary purpose was to present the Gospel plainly to people of every persuasion.

One particular evening, Peter peered into the darkness and perceived a person walking upon the water. "Jesus," he petitioned, "please prepare a path across the water for me also." When Jesus responded positively to his plea, Peter was pleased. But as he paced a path across the waves, his heart began to palpitate, and he panicked and pleaded profusely with Jesus for protection. Jesus pitied Peter, and protected him from this peril.

Later, proceeding the crucifixion, Peter was Jesus' preferred prayer partner, but kept placidly falling asleep. "I perceive no particular need for prayer; all appears peaceful, and peril seems implausible," pointed out Peter.
